

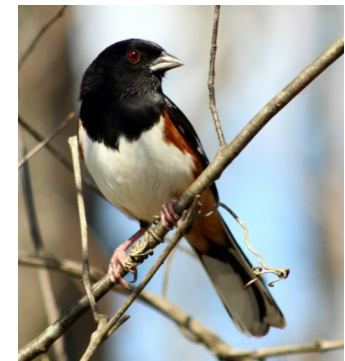

Key to abbreviations

- 1: Common; likely to be seen or heard in suitable habitat
- 2: Uncommon; present but not certain to be seen or heard
- 3: Occasional; regular, but seen only a few times during the season



Eastern Towhee

The habitat at Laurelville ranges from riparian forest to upper elevation forest and provides niches for a large variety of birds. Laurelville has over 70 recorded species of birds. Some are spring and fall migrants and others are found throughout the year. This list does not include our rare visitors. As you walk around the grounds keep your ears and eyes alert for Laurelville's feathered residents.

Where to look:

Main campus area: Cardinals, robins, chipping sparrows, phoebes

Sunset Hill: Mix of open field and wooded edges. Orioles, common yellowthroats, field sparrows, song sparrows

Red, blue, white, and yellow trails: Woods. Woodpeckers, titmice, wood thrushes, red-eyed vireos, wood warblers, scarlet tanagers

Overhead: Turkey vultures, crows, red-tailed hawks, chimney swifts
